

Israel- 1998

Background:

On its 50th birthday, Israel is a country of about 5.5 million people. The last decade and a half have been years of battle with terrorism (in Lebanon since 1982 and in the West Bank and Gaza since the first Intifada- 1987). However, while Israel copes with security challenges, everyday life continues.

Houses, neighborhoods, streets and roads are being built rapidly. Community centers, museums, art galleries, industrial areas and malls pop up everywhere. The Israeli hitech industry has become famous worldwide, with Israel holding the following records:

- Israel has the highest ratio of university degrees to the population in the world.
- Israel produces more scientific papers per capita than any other nation by a large margin - 109 per 10,000 people - as well as one of the highest per capita rates of patents filed.
- In proportion to its population, Israel has the largest number of startup companies in the world. In absolute terms, Israel has more startup companies than any other country in the world, except the US (3,500 companies mostly in hi-tech).
- Israel ranks third (in what?) in the industrialized world after the United States and Holland - and 12 percent hold advanced degrees

But Israelis don't invest their time only in building their country and work. The old Zionist tradition of hiking the land, walking the paths and picnicking in JNF forests is still very popular. In the 80s and 90s, new kinds of adventure sports were introduced in Israel. Rafting the Jordan River, gliding and mountain climbing join the adventures sports already known in Israel (such as snow and water skiing, boating and biking). Israelis love to spend a lot of time out in nature. During holidays and Saturdays, it is very common to hear on the news a message coming from the national parks service asking the Israelis not to head toward the parks as they are totally full...


